Summary: The Turn to the Native is a timely account of Native American literature & the critical writings that have grown up around it. The author considers racial & cultural "essentialism," the ambiguous position of non-Native critics in the field, cultural "soverreignty" & "property," & the place of Native American culture in a so-called multicultural era. Chapters follow on the relationship of Native American culture to postcolonial writing & postmodernism. The author comments on the recent work of numerous Native writers. The final chapter, "A Nice Jewish Boy among the Indians," presents the author's effort to balance his Jewish & working-class heritage, his adherence to Western "critical" ideals, & his ongoing loyalty to the values of Native cultures.
